There is real news coming out of and about that convention that will affect all its societies. We'll get it to you ASAP, so watch for it in an e-blast or our next *Language of Enchantment*.



A U.S. reading crisis

The pandemic has affected language and reading development in elementary students.

Since the beginning of the pandemic, Dana Goldstein, who covers education for The

Times, has been hearing from parents concerned that their young children's language development might have been hindered by masks in the classroom.

After the Omicron variant wave, when

some epidemiologists suggested that it was

time to start unmasking in schools, concern from parents "reached a fever pitch," Dana said. "But when I got on the phone with speech pathologists and phonics experts, they cast a lot of doubts on the correlation," Dana said. "There's not rigorous data at this point that would suggest that masks are the cause of the issue."

"However, I continued down the road of talking to speech and reading experts and heard about a lot of other really big deficits," she said.

Perhaps most concerning: About a third of children in the youngest grades are missing reading benchmarks, up significantly from before the pandemic, according to a cluster of recent studies. In Virginia, one study found that early reading skills were at a 20-year low this fall, data that the researchers called "alarming."

What's In a Federation by any Other Name—Like NFSPS?

Any member of the NMSPS is automatically a member of the National Federation of State Poetry Society (NFSPS), but what does that entail?. Once upon a time (say 2006, when I joined the NMSPS), I had no idea how being a member of the Federation could affect or benefit me. I was just glad to have contact with other poets. Several people had said that perks of membership included "contests" and the Federation's quarterly newsletter *Strophes*. I knew about *Strophes*, but "contests" rang no familiar bells, and the NFSPS still seemed a faint, distant galaxy.

All that changed in 2008, when then NMSPS President George Forrest convinced me to enter the venerable NFSPS Annual Contests—and then attend the Annual Convention at which winners were announced. As George took me along to officers' meetings and various events, and as I met Federation veterans, I discovered its goals for all NFSPS members, its efforts to support America's youth poets, and how Federation practices embody NFSPS values and culture.

At the 2008 Convention, I saw how NFSPS membership benefits both State Societies and individuals. Those benefits have four iterations: contests, conventions, collaboration, and community. In this newsletter, I'll talk about contests and leave the rest to future articles. I want to help all in NMSPS understand what impact the Federation can have on us and our poetry.

Not everyone is a closet poet. For many in the NFSPS, the words *poet* and *competitor* are synonymous. Every year, the NFSPS affords all its members—beginners to experts—a unique opportunity to submit poems for cash prizes and publication and to do it at a discounted, ridiculously low entry fee. Nonmembers pay double the fees and are ineligible to enter more than a dozen contests open to Members Only.

A Federation member can submit by snail mail or electronically, nonmembers can enter only through Submittable.com online services. Members pay \$1 per poem up to ten poems or a flat fee for anything more than ten poems: \$10 if sent via USPS, \$12 if submitted electronically. An exception is Contest 1, which has a First Prize of \$1,000, so it charges members \$5 (nonmembers pay \$10) each for up to three poems. There is no entry fee for Contests numbered 51, 52 or 53 because they are for students in grades 3 through 12. Students do, however, get cash awards and publication in *Encore*. Last year, NFSPS gave out more than \$8,000 to prize winners in all 53 categories.

Poems by the top three winners in each of the 53 contests, plus a list of all honorable mentions, is published in the annual *Encore Prize Poems* anthology, available since 2017 on Amazon.com. NFSPS sponsors four other annual competitions:

Stevens Poetry Manuscript Competition awards \$1,000 plus publication and 50 copies for a single author's poetry collection.

College Undergraduate Poetry (CUP) Competition awards two students \$500 each and publication plus 75 copies of their winning chapbooks.

BlackBerryPeach Prizes for Poetry: Spoken & Heard awards poetry performers \$1,000, \$500, and \$250 prizes, plus chapbook publication and convention travel stipends.

The Manningham Trust Student Poetry Contest features cash prizes and publication in its own chapbook. The competition has two divisions: junior (grades 6-8) and senior (grades 9-12).

Federation contests not only motivate members to write more poetry, learn new poetic forms, hone their skills, and gain recognition, but also allow veteran poets drawn from a pool of past winners to earn their chops as contest judges. Except for the judge of the Contest 1: Founders' Award (grand prize), all judges are volunteers. This is also true for State Societies who run their own contests. NFSPS is an all-volunteer organization, and that fact dictates values, customs, and policies throughout the organization. One of those is to support all its members, not just those considered "celebrities."

Some State Societies benefit from using contests as fundraisers that do double duty by serving as training grounds for their own members to acquire skills and experience. Many affiliates have been doing this for decades.

In the past, NMSPS also ran contests and printed anthologies of members' poems, but those practices had lapsed. Now, however, our Contest Chair Zach Kluckman is gearing up for an anthology that will contain poems by attendees at the 2022 NMSPS State Convention and more innovations like our recent video contest.

Speaking of conventions, I will address that subject in my next article for *Language of Enchantment*, our newsletter recently revived by Communications Chair Jannetta Lamourt (thanks so much for your hard work). Look for it in email inboxes (or trapped in spam blockers) everywhere. Remember to enter Jannetta's email address, communications@nmpoetry.com, in your address book to prevent your newsletter from being branded as spam and ending up in the abyss.
