It has been quite a year in my life, as I'm sure it has been in yours. My family and I, thanks be to God, are happy and well. I pray you and yours are, too.



## It's All About Community

### From Shirley Blackwell, NMSPS Board Chancellor

In the past two issues of this newsletter, I wrote about *Contests* and *Conventions*, two of the four benefits I've cited for why poets should join NMSPS and, by extension, the National Federation of State Poetry Societies (NFSPS). I had planned to write about Benefit #3, *Collaboration*, but I'll skip to #4, *Community* for this issue because of two recent experiences.

The first was that I attended the inaugural NFSPS National BlackBerry Peach Poetry Slam in Daytona Shores, Florida, in late October. To read a review of the BBP Slam, click here.

If you just clicked and read that, you can guess that the event was something special, but there is no way to express how it made me feel to actually be present. There was an almost palpable sense that we were witnessing a historical turning point, and a definite feeling that it would change us personally as well.

I cannot imagine a more diverse group than the 40 contestants who came, nor a more "establishment" group that welcomed them. But the welcome was warm and sincere, and connecting with one another was amazingly swift. Everyone there seemed committed to create a magic bubble in time, a community built on honesty and trust. It sounds cliché, but it was real and profound.

The second experience was the open mic readings my home chapter, the Rio Grande Valencia (RGV) poets gave at the Hub City (Belen) Art Co-op on December 11, 2022. Like other Society chapters, some RGV folks have known each other for years. I've learned that, when poets repeatedly share their poetry—and, therefore, their lives—with each other, it creates a special bond between them. At the open mic, I read poems to my RGV friends that I would seriously hesitate to share with strangers; and, I wasn't the only one who did.

What happens in NMSPS is common everywhere in the Federation. I have lasting friendships with poets I see only once every year or so at the national convention, and I'm not at all unusual in that regard. Call it friendship, community, camaraderie, or fellowship, but many of our members say that it is their main reason for joining NMSPS. It is also a bedrock principle of the NFSPS, whose mission statement concludes with these words:

It [NFSPS] is dedicated solely to the furtherance of poetry on the national level and serves to unite poets in the bonds of fellowship and understanding.



## Stan Crawford, *Secretary*, Member of the NMSPS Executive Board

Stan is an attorney and poet who moved to Albuquerque in 2019 with his wife, Dawn, and their menagerie of dogs and cats. He has published his work in Borderlands: Texas Poetry Review, the Comstock Review, the Midwest Quarterly, Poet Lore, the Water-Stone Review and elsewhere. His poetry collection Resisting Gravity was selected as a Finalist for the First Book of Poetry award given by the Texas Institute of Letters in 2017. Before moving to New Mexico, he served on the Board of Mutabilis Press, an independent publisher of poetry in Houston, for 18 years.



## Edward Pittman, *Chair*, Santa Fe Poetry Trails Chapter

Years ago, Edward Pittman's poems and short stories were published in the literary journals Analecta, Wellspring, Tiltted Planet Tales and Sidewinder. At the University of Texas, he was fortunate to study poetry with celebrated poet Albert Goldbarth and fiction with novelist, poet and essayist Zulfikar Ghose. Pittman also studied poetry with acclaimed poet and teacher Thomas Lux at the University of Iowa. To date, he's written four feature film screenplays and a 60-minute grounded sci-fi pilot for television. In addition to screenwriting, Pittman worked with charted Americana recording artist Arthur Godfrey to cowrite the full-length Americana musical "If I Only Knew Your Name." He recently adapted his horror script Dark Forest as a short novel. He lives in Santa Fe with his wife, Michelle, and their large pet family.

## Ready? Get Set... GO!!!

The Federation's (NFSPS) Annual Contests and its BlackBerry Peach Poetry Prizes (BBP3) open for submission on New Year's Day 2023, and close on the Ides (15th) of March.

The NFSPS's traditional 50 Annual Contests have expanded to 53, with the addition of three free contests for students in Grades 3-12. We're proud to say that NMSPS sponsors two of those student contests. Membership in NFSPS (via membership in our NM Society) lets you enter Categories #2 through #50 for \$10 total, plus a small PayPal fee if you enter online via Submittable.

Category #1, the Founders' Award (First Prize of \$1,000) charges members \$5 each for up to four poems; nonmembers pay double. Deadline is March 15. Click here for the NFSPS Poetry Contests for all contest rules and downloadable brochure with category themes. NM Newbies—read the rules carefully, and call Shirley at (505) 235-5735 if you have questions on how to submit.

**BlackBerry Peach (BBP3)** offers prizes for "Poetry Spoken and Heard." Contestants submit audio files, plus a print version of the four poems they have recorded. Prizes include cash, publication, and invitation to perform at National Convention, among other perks. Read rules carefully here.

## Hints to Submitters: Don't wait until the last five minutes to submit your files electronically.

For **Annual Contests**, there will be one application form (it goes to the Contest Chair) for all the poems you enter. Each poem (they go anonymously to the judge on a separate electronic channel) needs to be entered as its own file, and the best way to do that is load them in numerical order. That requires some back-and-forth in the Submittable system and will take time. So, put your poems in order from #2 to #50, pour a cup of coffee or tea, and get to it before noon on March 15.

Shirley will not be available for advice after 5:00 p.m. on March 15 regarding the Annual Contests submission. Nor will she be able to help with BBP3 at any stage, beyond referring you to the BBP3 Contest Chair. Good luck to all!
