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A Word from the President

Dear Members,

This is a new version of the email I sent out on 15 February asking for help. It's long, but please read it to the end for important context and more specifics. Our Society is facing a critical shortage of volunteers to serve in various capacities that support Society initiatives and projects. I am asking for help from all NMSPS members (and anyone else who will join NMSPS).

We must reevaluate how NMSPS functions. The ways we connected before Covid worked then, but the in-person social energy that powered us in the past is fading. We have over 100 members, but only about 20 percent of them do all the work, and even that number is shrinking. Current leaders are getting burnt out and hope to hand the torch to a new crew at the 2025 election. We need new blood and new ideas.

I want to share with you some of the challenges, decisions, and ideas the NMSPS Board has discussed at recent meetings. To clarify terms, the full NMSPS Board consists of three elements:

- Executive Board (President, Vice President, Secretary, and Treasurer)
- **Elected Board** includes the Executive Board plus Chapter Chairs **elected** by their respective members in Albuquerque, Santa Fe, Silver City, and Valencia County
- **Appointed Board** (Membership and Youth Chairs, Newsletter Editor, etc.), people I appoint to temporary **or** permanent projects. While their projects are active, they have a seat (and vote) on the full Board

Any NMSPS member can observe Zoom full Board meetings by requesting a zoom link from NMSPS Secretary Stan Crawford secretary@nmpoetry.com at least 24 hours in advance. The Board welcomes your insights, suggestions, even constructive criticism; but, if you have a concern/complaint, please also propose a solution and name someone willing to implement it. At any time, you may submit concerns in writing to president@nmpoetry.com.

Challenge A: Improving Social Interactions among NMSPS Members

NMSPS members are spread across our huge state and beyond, making it hard to participate in person. Hesitation about doing so (compliments of Covid) still persists. Inperson events that once drew us together have been replaced by Zoom. As a result, attendance has been sparse at recent NMSPS conventions and festivities. That factor influenced the decisions and options discussed below.

Board Decisions

1. NMSPS State Conventions will occur only in odd-numbered years to coincide with Board elections. A Zoom General Membership meeting will be held in even-numbered years to comply with the NMSPS Constitution. We need someone to chair a Convention Committee that oversees these events. Call me (Bernadette) at 505-991-1376 for details.

2. An Annual Poetry Fair will be held each October. We will keep the same location and approximate date (like they do for Poets' Picnic) to establish this as an NMSPS tradition. The fair could include various activities—from onstage haiku slams to bake sales, music performances to games. It will be free and open to the public. We will need volunteers of all kinds—emcees and cookie bakers, judges and ticket takers.

Other Ideas and Associated Requirements

1. Monthly Zoom Open Mic *for members only* to supplement, not replace, chapter meetings. We'd need volunteer(s) familiar with Zoom meetings to set up and host it and guide attendees in Zoom use and protocols.

2. Online or hybrid (combination Zoom and in-person) workshops, readings, presentations, or book release events *featuring NMSPS members*. These events would require volunteer(s) experienced in (or willing to learn) how to conduct hybrid meetings and operate associated equipment. YouTube know-how would be a plus.

Challenge B: Improving Member Involvement in NMSPS and the Community

Better communications and publicity are needed to maintain membership numbers at or above critical mass, increase youth involvement, keep members fully informed, and improve NMSPS visibility and collaboration with arts, education, and civic communities.

Board Decisions

1. *Language of Enchantment*, our newsletter, will be published quarterly and provided to all members in good standing. We need people adept at MailChimp to help with providing content, doing layout and graphics, and sending it out electronically.

2. The NMSPS Board is committed to improving advance planning and publicity so that NMSPS members and the public (where appropriate) will have enough time to plan for and avoid conflict with other community events, thereby increasing participation in our own.

Options and Associated Requirements

1. Regularly (e.g., every 2-3 years) publish an NMSPS anthology of members' poetry, like *Glissando!* (2023). We'd need a small committee chaired by a Chief Editor to solicit entries, receive submissions electronically, compile, edit, publish, and distribute the book. Editor will have a seat on the Board during the full production process and will coordinate with the Executive Board on decisions to be made at each stage.

2. Expand our Poets in the Classroom (PITC) program. Members who have contacts (friends, relatives) in schools that might welcome our program can be great scouts for new PITC venues. We must make sure that a designated person on site (teacher, librarian, principal) will organize all administrative and logistical details for the visits. Chapter Chairs are best situated to get their members to turn out as participating poets.

3. Explore strategies to increase involvement of young people in NMSPS. Fill Youth Chair vacancy. Invite youth to send representative(s) to Board meetings so that they have a voice and can share valuable insights on best ways to recruit more youth members.

4. Publicize ways to support the Society besides holding a leadership post or taking on longterm tasks. Events like conventions or fairs will need book room attendants, T-shirt sellers, and those who just show up. For those who can't make it to outside events, home is a great place to judge a poetry contest, make phone calls to new members, or write an article for our newsletter. Even a few hours' service now and then can benefit the Society. Volunteers do not always need to be experts; they just *need to care.*

Challenge C: How Do We Pay for What We Want?

NMSPS annual dues of \$20 are barely enough to keep the lights on, and only if we have a minimum of 100 members. In making this point, we owe you, our members, an explanation of how your \$\$ is spent. Among the expenses are:

- · annual filing and registration fees to State and Feds to keep our nonprofit status
- website fees (domain names, software, maintenance)
- · USPS box rental, postage, shipping costs
- · Zoom services for Board and Chapter meetings
- · Chapter support (room rental, speakers' honoraria)
- membership in the NFSPS (National Federation)
- support for non-NMSPS events (AZ-NM Book Awards, Poets' Picnic) that promote our own members and mission
- · miscellaneous supplies (posters, flyers, pencils, ink cartridges)

Options and Associated Requirements

1. Increase dues, currently set at \$20 for those who have reached their 22nd birthday; anyone younger can join NMSPS for free. For each member on our rolls, we send the NFSPS \$3 per year (that includes youth). We haven't raised dues since about 2012.

The perennial question from prospective members is, "What will I get for my money?" and we expect that current members might ask, "What more will I get if my dues go up?" To maintain—much less expand—services, we need more money or more helpers, and probably both.

2. Conduct FUNraisers, such as the fall festival, which provide entertainment and revenue. Experienced emcees, organizers, PR pros, and those willing to do plain old grunt work are vital for such events to succeed.

3. Solicit donations for NMSPS. The ideal volunteer would have contacts with businesses and community organizations willing to give us merchandise, money, or services.

4. Apply for grants. An experienced grant writer would be a godsend for NMSPS. We need someone who knows how nonprofits should go about getting grants and will write the applications.

Volunteerism is **huge** with grantors; many will give money to match "in kind" work done by our members, as long as we record the hours we put in on a project. Grantors often require applicants to pledge "matching funds," for which donated hours often substitute. See? Your time IS money for NMSPS!

Challenge D: Filling Vacant NMSPS Officer and Board Positions

The posts listed below need filling RIGHT NOW. We have noted the skills needed and duties of each job. If you are willing to serve in any of these posts, please call or write me. Contact information is below and on our website www.nmpoetry.com.

Vice President - A leader open to change and dedicated to promoting NMSPS interests and programs; keeping communication open among all members; honoring the Society's history, traditions, and culture; and familiar with standard fiduciary principles. Will be mentored by the current President in expectation of assuming the presidency of NMSPS upon election in 2025.

Treasurer - The Treasurer is ESSENTIAL to the smooth running of our Society. He/She works closely with the Webmaster and the Membership Chair. This job needs someone who knows or will learn how to work with Excel, has bookkeeping skills, and will keep financial records current. The Treasurer will deliver financial reports at quarterly Board meetings

(Zoom) and attend NMSPS activities involving money transactions—typically, the state convention on odd years and the annual fall festival. Candidate should be generally reachable, since some issues that demand a quick response come up between scheduled meetings. Workload peaks around the time of quarterly Board meetings; summers are slow.

The Treasurer is responsible for annual filing of three official forms with the IRS and NM agencies regarding our nonprofit status; each of these filings takes only a few minutes to do online. The Treasurer will oversee our PayPal transactions and monitor our Non-Taxable Transaction Certificates (NTTCs). NMSPS has automated software to manage member dues, and it is compatible with various other bookkeeping software.

NMSPS Youth Chair - We have more youth members than ever before and would like to bring even more into NMSPS. They need a leader who works well with young people and wants to help NMSPS develop or expand youth participation.

Santa Fe, Chapter Chair- Are you willing to lead the Santa Fe Poetry Trails Chapter? This involves coordinating with other members to expedite monthly open mics (the current format). You would be the information conduit to keep chapter members in the loop about local, state, and national poetry matters and to bring their ideas and concerns to the Board.

If we want to survive as a force in NM poetry, we must not only accept, but embrace change. If we want to thrive, we need revolutionary change. We need new volunteers and/or younger members at the helm who believe in poetry and want to help shape its future and that of NMSPS. For every suggestion above, we need people to organize, show up, set up, and clean up. I urge every member to help out where you can. To paraphrase JFK, "*Ask not what your Poetry Society can do for you, ask what you can do for your Poetry Society!*"

When Poetry and Music Come Together

When submitting a poem to a contest, I don't suppose anyone expects to win. You hope but don't let your expectations get ahead of you. So, when I responded to the call for the inaugural True Concord Voices Poetry Contest in 2023, where they asked poets to write about how music brings us together, I wasn't holding my breath. And then when I got the notice that my sonnet, "A World That Shimmers," won, I could barely breathe. Especially because part of the prize was to have my poem set to music by the 2023 Stephen Paulus Emerging Composer, Nicholas Ryan Kelly. Months later when Dave and I traveled to Tucson, AZ, to hear the piece performed by the Grammy Award-winning True Concord Voices and Orchestra, I had never heard the music and had no idea what to expect. I was in the audience for the premiere performance, again holding my breath. I have pasted the sonnet and a link to a Score Video of this performance from Nick's YouTube channel below. I have to say that this must be one of the most moving experiences of my life—to have someone else read my poem and then demonstrate that they "got" what I was trying to say by setting it to music! The music of poetry; the poetry of music—a 24-voice choir, piano, cello, and my words.

NFSPS, INC., and the Georgia Poetry Society are pleased to announce the Invocational Poems Contest for Convention 2024.

Subject: No cash prizes, but winning invocational poems will be read by winners at the beginning of convention meals.

Criteria: The paramount consideration is poetic value, not religious orthodoxy: "It must be first of all a poem." Poems should be suitable for a religiously diverse membership, should use gender-inclusive, contemporary language, and should have equal value for the religious and the non-religious.

Form: Any form, not to exceed 30 lines. Name the form on your entry.

Eligibility: Open to all poets. No fee to enter. Limits: 4 Poems per poet. Must be the original work of the poet, unpublished, not submitted elsewhere for publication, and not a previous host-contest winning poem. Typed or printed from the computer. One poem per page.

Deadline: April 30, 2024, postmark.

Winners: Notified individually by mail in April of the year 2024. We place a high value on your reading of your own poem, but we will provide a substitute reader if you cannot be present at the convention in June.

Copies: Two. Your name and postal address and name of your chosen form at upper right corner of one; name of contest and chosen form only in upper right corner of the other. Poems will not be returned.

Ownership: NFSPS receives the right to have the poem read at this convention. You retain all other rights.

Seeking Poetry Contest Judges

NMSPS has agreed to a request from SouthWest Writers (SWW) to judge the poetry entries in its upcoming 2024 contests. As you may know, SWW focuses mainly on prose genres, so they are seeking specialists in poetry to judge in three categories: haiku, limericks, and free verse. Judges will receive blind copy entries by email on July 8. They will have until July 30 to select 1st, 2nd, and 3rd places, plus at least one honorable mention. SWW has given NMSPS free rein to manage and judge the contests as it sees fit. Our word will be final.

Judges will remain anonymous until awards are announced in October. They will not receive honorariums, but they may choose to have a short bio and photo of themselves included in the anthology of prize poems that will be published in time for the October event. NMSPS will also be given a page in the anthology promoting our Society and acknowledging our contribution.

Submission does not open until June 1. Contest information will be posted soon on the SWW website, https://www.southwestwriters.com/. Members of NMSPS will be able to enter the contests, and even the poetry judges can enter in a category they themselves are not judging. If you are willing to judge one of the three categories, please contact Shirley Blackwell at (505) 235-5735 between 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. any day but Sunday.
